- Amateur repeaters in this portion of the band be grandfathered to continue operation for a number of years, with the number to be decided by Industry Canada.
- A section of 150 kHz of spectrum in the 220-222 June 12 Central Ontario Fleamarket -Hamfest Fergus ON MHz band be designated as public service spectrum to be shared by amateur and mobile services for special public safety and disaster communications applications.
 - The band 219-220 MHz is allocated on a Carp ON secondary basis to the Amateur service in Canada, which would be in harmony with a similar allocation in the USA.
 - The band from 222-225 MHz remains as a primary exclusive amateur allocation.

Following consultation with Canadian amateurs in a survey conducted in July 2002 RAC, as a member of the RABC, has vigorously opposed these proposed changes without success.

Industry Canada must now take this advice, together with input from RAC, decide on a course of action, and in all likelihood conduct a public consultation before issuing a decision. The prospects do not look good.

OTTAWA COMPANY STUDYING USE OF BPL (Broad Band over Power Line) for HOMEOWNER CONNECTION TO THE INTERNET

CBC radio reported today that a Hydro Ottawa affiliate is hoping internet users will go online through their electrical outlets.

A Telecom Ottawa spokesperson was reported as saying that testing of the technology in Ottawa is still in the very preliminary stages, but the U.S. and Quebec have also been testing the system to see, " if it actually works and, if it's compatible with Canadian distribution systems".

The company says they will work with Industry After studying the spectrum needs of various Canada to make sure the technology complies with all federal services over the past 18 months, the Radio Advisory Board regulations. German utilities company RWE started offering of Canada (RABC) has decided to recommend to Industry internet service over power lines the summer of 2001, and Canada that the 220-222 MHz band be transferred from the Swedish company Sydkraft also offers the service. Canadian tech company Nortel ran tests of the technology in Britain in the late 1990s and concluded that it would be far too expensive to adapt power grids to carry internet signals. Hydro-Québec plans to start testing the service this month, and hopes to offer the service in a few years.

Jim Carroll, author of "Surviving the Information Age" was quoted as saying that "broadband over power annual St. Patrick's Day Parade to be held Sunday March line" has its critics. Ham radio operators in the U.S. are complaining that the new technology will interfere with their operators as possible to assist along the parade route. We signals.

Scanners hear it First By FREDERICK HART, VE2LSQ

Welcome back from the holidays hope all went well for you and yours....By the way "Happy New Year" and all the best for 2 0 0 4...I look forward to keeping you, the readership entertained by way of my scribblings about scanning the frequencies that interest us the most.

There was a lot of action over the holiday period so your ears were certainly getting their full...Unfortunately some of the incidents that happened in the Montreal area involved loss of life which is saddening to hear. SSIM (Montreal Fire Dept.) went out of 2003 and came into 2004 with fatal house fires. The end of December incident was in the territory of SSIM station 66 (this fire was just a dozen or so houses away from where I am hospitalized). A young man perished in a early morning blaze in a two story structure that was a total loss. An SSIM lieutenant fell from an aerial-platform apparatus and suffered a broken hip so flick through the pages next month and catch a glimpse during the opening moments. The January fatal fire was in the territory of SSIM, station 38. There, two elderly women perished in a residence they lived in.
